

From the Rabbi's Study



PURIM - light side and deep, dark side:

On February 28 this year we celebrate Purim. Usually, we tend to see Purim as a light-hearted fun celebration. We read the Book of Esther, make loud noises to drown out the name of the villain Haman, masquerade, and have Purim carnivals. It is a rejoicing event over the escape from the attempt of a powerful enemy in the ancient empire of Persia to destroy the Jewish People.

However, there is a foreboding and dangerous significance to Purim. According to Talmudic tradition Haman was a descendant of the last king of the Amalekites - the group of desert terrorists who would prey on unsuspecting caravans and travelers in the desert between

Egypt and Syria; and who attacked the People of Israel right after their escape from slavery in Egypt. The Israelites were weary and not yet fully organized for their trek to the land of their ancestors, when the Amalekites attacked the stragglers in the caravan, the sick and the elderly who could not easily defend themselves. Ultimately, Joshua and the soldiers of Israel drove off the Amalekites.

The people then vowed that when they would be settled in their own land they would utterly destroy the Amalekites and thus rid the world of that terroristic scourge. In the biblical text, God tells the people that there will be war with Amalek from generation to generation.

Even though the Amalekites, who can be considered as one of the earliest terror groups in history, were ultimately destroyed, the war between those who would destroy Israel and the Jewish People goes on throughout every generation in one form or another. In our generation those who would destroy Western civilization have Israel as their first target. The State of Israel, to protect its own existence, has had to become one of the leading opponents and warriors against terrorism.

We should enjoy our victories on Purim, but we must always be aware that the war is not over. Our continued existence as the Jewish People is totally involved with Western civilizations efforts and need to defeat the same common enemies who are spiritual descendants of Haman and the Amalekites.

May we always strive to be worthy of the responsibility that God has given us.


Signup list for the luncheon like she did for Tu B'Shevat so please look into it. We look forward to a special service for all ages.


