According to Ritual Chairperson, Katherine Kohrman, these teens are an outstanding example of the confident and competent leaders that our B'nai Mitzvah program produces. They infused our service with *ru'ach* (high spirit) as they clearly enjoyed themselves –with both the singing and the socializing. Those participating were Rachel Goldman, Spencer and Adrianna Tingley, and Rachel and Michael Arena.

HIGH HOLIDAYS AT ADATH ISRAEL

Rosh Hashanah begins fairly early this year, on Sunday evening, September 9. Yom Kipuur follows a week later beginning with the Kol Nidre service on Tuesday evening, September 18. As always, we will have options on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur of different styled services to meet your family's needs. These range from the traditional adult service in the sanctuary, to shorter and more lively youth services, to a young children's service. There will also be babysitting and snacks available for young children.

Highlights of the season include our outdoor Tashlich gathering and potluck dinner on the first day of Rosh Hashanah and our community Break-the-Fast at the conclusion of Yom Kippur. We also look forward to Cantor Jill Rabin joining us once again. Her beautiful chanting of the traditional holiday melodies pulls us immediately into the spirit of the season.

Shofar so good!

During the month of Elul, the Ba'al Tekiah starts practice for their duty, a sacred call to enable the community to hear the call of the Shofar during the High Holidays.

A Shofar is a hollow horn from a kosher animal such as a

ram. Cut and drilled, it functions much as any horn, trumpet, or bugle; the ease of its use very dependent on how well crafted the part to be placed against the lips produces an acceptable embouchure (the fit or way a horn blower applies to do the blowing).



The Shofar Service commences with specific liturgy, giving thanks for the commandment to hear it and that we've thrived to arrive at "this" day (shehecheyanu).

During the service, four types of Shofar blasts are rendered, Tekiah, Shevarim, Teruah, and the Tekiah Gedolah.

The long note of the Tekiah hearkens to the Coronation of G-d as King, and wakes the soul to our Sovereign. The Shevarim, or three shorter wailing sounds or sobs, reminds us of the pain in our souls for failing to be what we could have been, not living to be our best. The nine quick and staccato sounds of the Teruah act as a wake up alarm call to act now, and be honest with ourselves to be what we can be in the coming year.

Finally, the Tekiah Gedolah, meant to be long and strong to give hope and inspire us; it's the last of the series, and the only Shofar blast at the end of the Yom Kippur Neilah Service, or the Closing of the Gates.

I will be teaching Shofar technique on Sunday, August 26th at the shul. Bring your Shofar (if you have one), some breath and an open mind. We can stir our souls anew and pass on this ancient tradition through the generations!

BLACKOUT CHOCOLATE BANANA BREAD

Published from Web Recipes From the Kitchen of Nancy Bamberg

Ingredients:

Nonstick vegetable oil spray 3/4 cup all purpose flour 1/2 cup whole wheat flour 1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa powder 1-1/4 tsp. baking soda 3/4 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. kosher salt 1 Tablespoon demerara sugar 5 very large ripe bananas, divided
1 cup plus 2 Tablespoons light brown sugar
6 Tablespoons unsalted butter, room temp.
2 large eggs
1/3 cup sour cream
1 tsp. vanilla extract
4 ounces bittersweet chocolate, chopped

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 350°. Lightly coat an 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ loaf pan with nonstick spray. Line bottom of pan with parchment paper, leaving a generous overhang on long sides.

Whisk all purpose flour, whole wheat flour, cocoa powder, baking soda, baking powder and salt in a medium bowl.

Mash 4 bananas with a potato masher or fork in a medium bowl until smooth. Using an electric mixer on medium-high speed (or a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment), beat brown sugar and butter in a large bowl until light and fluffy, about 4-5 minutes. Add eggs one at a time and beat until incorporated, scraping down sides of bowl if needed. Reduce speed to medium-low, add sour cream, vanilla, and mashed bananas; beat until combined. The mixture may look grainy and broken at this point, but don't fret! It will emulsify when the dry ingredients are added.

Reduce mixer speed to low and gradually add dry ingredients, beating just until incorporated (do not overmix or cake will become tough). Fold in chocolate.

Scrape batter into prepared pan and smooth top. Slice remaining banana lengthwise into 3 equally thick planks and place on top of cake, cut sides up. Sprinkle batter, trying to avoid bananas, with demerara sugar.

Bake cake until a tester inserted into the center comes out clean (there may be some melted chocolate residue left on the tester, which is fine), 65-75 minutes.

Transfer pan to a wire rack and let cake cool completely. Using parchment overhang, lift cake from pan and serve.
