ROSH HASHANAH

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, begins fairly late this year, on Sunday evening, September 29. As you dip apples in honey and contemplate the year gone by, we hope that you will also join us for holiday services. They begin with a short evening service on Sunday at 7:30 pm. They continue Monday morning at 8:30 am and Tuesday morning at 9:00 am. As always, we will have options on the first day of Rosh Hashanah, of different styled services to meet your family's needs. These range from the traditional adult service in the sanctuary, to shorter and more lively youth services, to a young children's service. There will also be babysitting and snacks available for young children.

A highlight of the season is our outdoor Tashlich gathering and potluck dinner on the first day of Rosh Hashanah. We also look forward to Cantor Jill Rabin joining us once again. Her beautiful chanting of the traditional holiday melodies pulls us immediately into the spirit of the season.

If you are new to our community, the High Holidays present an excellent opportunity to get involved, to meet new people and to make new friends. Contact the synagogue office or <u>ritual@congadathisrael.org</u> for further information on how you and your family can participate.

TASHLICH

Hope you'll all join us for our Tashlich potluck dinner on Monday evening following Rosh Hashanah services. We have such a good time at Dickinson

Park. At Tashlich we throw stale bread, symbolically tossing our year's sins into the stream. Afterwards, everyone contributes part of the dairy (non-meat) meal and we relax together. RSVP to ritual@congadathisrael.org if you will be coming to Tashlich. But if you forget to RSVP, please come anyways. We'll be under the pavilion on Elm Drive in Newtown starting at 5 pm. All are welcome this is a child friendly, adult friendly, everyone friendly event. Our Tashlich service lasts about 10 minutes, the rest is all schmoozing, playing and trying each other's cooking.

OUR SANCTUARY DOOR IS OPEN to go in and out as you wish.

For any who aren't aware of our traditions at Adath Israel, it would probably be helpful to know that it is perfectly fine to come and go from our Sanctuary at almost any point during our services. This is true all year, but especially so during the High Holidays when our services may be much too long for some. We aren't a large enough congregation to offer more than one style of adult service at a time and so congregants need to be able to style a service to meet their own needs. We begin our morning services at 8:30 am (9:00 am on the second day of Rosh Hashanah) for those more traditional congregants who wish to chant through the early morning prayers. But if 9:30 or 10:00 am is more to your liking, please come then. And if you are dropping your child(ren) off at the children or youth services that begin at 10:30, you are welcome to bring them into the Sanctuary with you if you arrive early. Or you can plan to arrive right at 10:30 and join us in the Sanctuary after you have settled your little ones.

If you see that the door to the Sanctuary is closed, it is most often simply a matter of keeping out the noise of the foyer. It is not meant to keep you out!! There is only one time during the year when our Sanctuary door is closed and we do not allow anyone to enter. That is during the chanting of the Kol Nidre during the service on the eve of Yom Kippur. For about 20 minutes that evening there is no entry, so as not to interrupt the solemnity of the moment. But that is the only time we ask late comers to wait in the foyer. At all other times, please enter freely, and look to the usher for instructions. There are moments, most often when the Ark is open and the congregation is standing, or when the Torah is being read, that you will be asked to stay near the entrance door and not walk to the pews. The usher will let you know when it is okay to take your seats. When the time comes that you are ready to leave the Sanctuary, please try to do so quietly. There

will be a point in both the Rosh Hashanah service and in the Yom Kippur service when we will fully pause to allow those who do not wish to stay for the Musaf service to exit comfortably. Musaf is an additional service that comes after the Rabbi delivers his sermon and our Board President speaks. Musaf begins with the *Hineni* prayer, a tremendously powerful and beautiful midieval prayer. The pause will come immediately after *Hineni*.

POTATO KUGEL

8 generous servings

1 ¾ lbs potatoes (1/3 of the potatoes in a 5 lb bag)

- 1 medium sized onion
- 3 x-large or jumbo sized eggs
- 1 ½ teaspoon salt
- 2 Tablespoon all purpose flour

1/3 cup canola oil

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Peel and grate the potatoes. (I use the grating attachment on a Cuisinart food processor. But grating can also be done by hand using the roughest (largest) side of a hand grater).

Drain grated potatoes in a colander for five minutes and then press down on them to release additional liquid -but no need to squeeze out every last bit!

Grate or finely chop the onion. Save all its juices.

In a large bowl, beat the eggs.

Add all ingredients into the eggs and stir well.

Lightly oil a 7" X 11" baking dish and pour in potato mixture.

Bake uncovered for one hour. Depending on your oven, it may take an additional 15 minutes. The kugel is done when it is firm on the top and lightly browned around the edges. The sooner the kugel is baked after grating the potatoes, the lighter in color it will be. If you let the potatoes sit too long it will still taste good but it takes on an unpleasant grey cast.

This kugel can be served immediately after baking. Or it can be made several days ahead and reheated before serving. If reheating, cover tightly with aluminum foil. Place in a 350 degree oven for 40 minutes. Remove foil and continue heating an additional 10 -15 minutes until fully hot.

The kugel can also be made ahead of time and frozen. If freezing, cover tightly with foil and then place in a plastic bag. Defrost the kugel fully, remove from the plastic bag, and follow the reheating instructions above.

This recipe can easily be transformed into a Passover recipe by replacing the flour with matzoh meal. It can also be transformed into a gluten-free recipe by replacing the flour with a gluten-free flour mix or with corn meal or with oat flour (whip rolled oats briefly in a food processor). The recipe can also be doubled or tripled easily. Just use a larger baking dish and adjust the baking time.

The original recipe for potato kugel, that I developed this recipe from, <u>came from the Fairmount Cookbook published in 1957</u> by the Fairmount Temple Sisterhood in Beachwood OH. It was the contribution of Mrs. Barnett R. Brickner (women in the 1950's didn't get to have their own names). She was the Rebbetzin (Rabbi's wife) at Fairmount temple (at the time the largest Reform Congregation in the US) for 33 years, and apparently a great cook! The original recipe called for chicken schmaltz, which I have replaced with canola oil, and baking powder which I have omitted. I've made enough changes to the recipe to call it my own now, but with a nod to Mrs. Brickner. Turns out she did have a name of her own, which I found in a google search – Rebecca Ena Aaronson.
