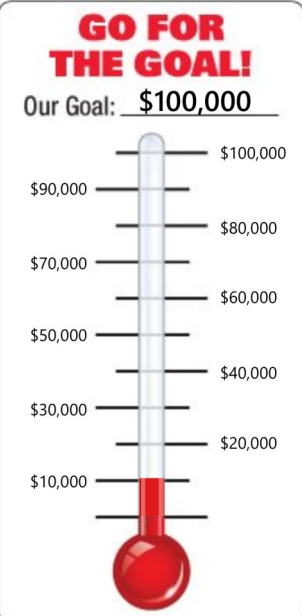

New Year, New Month

This month is filled with outstanding Jewish observances- Rosh Hashanah, Shofar sounding, Tashlikh, Yom Kippur, Yizkor, Sukkot, Lulav and Etrog, eating in the Sukkah, Simkhat Torah, reading the end and beginning of the Torah.

Most of our Jewish people have some Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur involvement or at least awareness. However, what is truly the greatest enjoyment of the season is forgotten or neglected. The Festival of Sukkot can and should be the high point of the fulfillment of the season because it emphasizes the physical and intellectual blessings and pleasures of our existence. There is actually a statement in the Talmud that says that the High Holy Days are preparation for the enjoyment of Sukkot. Sukkot is the original Thanksgiving holiday, to express appreciation for the fulfillment of our needs that the earth provides. The Sukkah and the Lulav and Etrog observances speak to us of how God's creation of Nature gives us everything we need to live satisfied and happy. This Festival can recharge our feelings of the goodness of life to such a high level that we can feel its influence for the entire year for a wonderfully positive attitude about our lives.

I invite and urge everyone to join us in our synagogue for our Sukkot observances beginning with Pizza in the hut (sukkah) Sunday evening October 13, Sukkot morning worship on Monday October 14, Sukkot Sabbath Eve service on October 18 and Simkhat Torah celebration Monday evening October 21.

KOL NIDRE

DON'T MISS THE RECITATION OF KOL NIDRE

[We reprint this information yearly, for several months running, in hopes that no one will be closed out of the Sanctuary and disappointed to miss the recitation of Kol Nidre]

If you see that the door to the Sanctuary is closed, it is most often simply a matter of keeping out the noise of the foyer. It is not meant to keep you out!! There is only *one* time during the entire year when our Sanctuary door is closed and we do not allow anyone to enter. That is during the chanting of the Kol Nidre during the service on the eve of Yom Kippur. For about 20 minutes that evening there is no entry, so as not to interrupt the solemnity of the moment. But that is the *only* time we ask late comers to wait in the foyer. At all other times, please enter freely, and look to the usher for instructions.

Please don't be late to the Kol Nidre Service.

Tuesday evening, October 8.

SUKKOT

Celebrating Sukkot this year, we will hold a morning service on Monday October 14 at 10:00 am. This is the first day of Sukkot and everyone in the Sanctuary will have an opportunity to smell the fragrant *etrog* (Israeli citron fruit) and shake the *lulov* (fronds of palm, myrtle and willow). The service will be followed by refreshments in the *Sukkah*.

SIMCHAT TORAH



Simchat Torah is the Jewish holiday that marks the cycling of the year's Torah readings. The Torah is both completed and started anew, without pause. The last verses of Deuteronomy are chanted and then the first verses of Genesis are, as well. There is a lot of dancing, singing, candy, and ceremony. It is a fun evening in the synagogue for young and old alike. Children parade around the sanctuary absorbing the pure joy of being Jewish. Our Simchat Torah service this year is on Monday evening October 21, from 6:30 pm to approximately 8:00 pm. We know that it is a school night and we have arranged the order of the service so that everything that includes young children will be over by around 7:15 pm. Just before the start of Simchat Torah, we will have a traditional Yizkor memorial service. That will begin at 6:00 pm.

LOOKING FOR TORAH READERS FOR SIMCHAT TORAH

We are looking for a few more readers who would like to learn to chant one line of Torah. It's a good introduction to Torah if you've never chanted before and a good reintroduction if it's been a long time since you were a bar mitzvah boy or girl of 13. Your line of verse can be so short that you can memorize it off a recording. You don't need to be fluent or even knowledgeable in Torah melodies, barely need to be able to read Hebrew, and you don't need to be able to carry a tune. You just need to have a Jewish love for Torah and a desire to be part of the Adath Israel family.

A Guest D'var Torah

On the day before their wedding, Miryam Wilson, daughter of long time congregants Susan and Michael Wilson and her fiancée Michael Reardon helped lead the Shabbat morning service. Miryam celebrated by co-leading the Shachrit prayers and chanting Torah, and by having an *Oufruf*, a special pre-nuptial Aliyah. Michael, an ordained Episcopal Priest led English readings and delivered a moving D'var Torah. One week earlier they had also been on our bimah co-leading the Friday evening service. It was the morning after that joyous service that we discovered our synagogue had been vandalized by antisemitic Neo Nazi graffiti. Below are excerpts of Michael's D'var Torah as he grappled with the stark contrast of the warm and welcoming Kabbalat Shabbat Service and the ugliness of antisemitism.

"...This brings us, in our Torah portion from Deuteronomy 15, to the notion of 'jubilee.' Jubilee is the idea that every seven years, one would be subject to the total remission of debts. The text states, "And this is the manner of remission: every creditor shall remit the claim that is held against a neighbor, not exacting it of a neighbor who is a member of the community, because the Lord's remission has been proclaimed (Deut 15:2)." It continues, "If there is among you anyone in need, a member of your community in any of your towns within the land that the Lord your God is giving you, do not be hard-hearted or tight-fisted toward your needy neighbor. You should rather open your hand, willingly lending enough to meet the need, whatever it may be (Deut 15:7-8)."

"The commandments laid out in Deuteronomy 15 are clear. They make specific and scheduled economic obligations of us. But, the idea of jubilee moves beyond this—our understanding of God and what God desires for us is far greater than an economic manifesto. Jubilee is about a revolution of the heart. This revolution is not reserved for the grand, but must be practiced in ordinary moments. It calls us to empty ourselves in love for others, going far beyond what is customary and expected."

At this point Michael described how Miryam had helped him go off on a pre-wedding hike to shed some of his growing stress. He described the woods: "... Likewise, the leaves do not consider whether to fall when autumn comes—they simply do. They fall so that they might lay atop the forest floor, decompose, and nourish the soil that feeds the wider forest ecosystem. And the fallen log does the same without thought—it decomposes and enriches the soil. This is the way of my bride—she gives without considering that she might have done otherwise, and this is the call of God to God's people."

Then Michael concluded: "God calls us to give as if we do not know that we could have done otherwise. To give out of our own nature—to give in an economic sense as well as an emotional sense. It pains me to have learned of the evil that took place here last weekend. The action itself pains me, that someone might be so filled with hate. And its effect pains me, that people might feel unsafe or unwelcome, and that these actions may call into question the value of hospitality, compassion, and openness in the midst of a dangerous world. This, I believe, is the entrapment of evil; its intention is to deter good-hearted humans from acting as they otherwise would. Evil actions attempt to dictate the terms of life, hoping that others might begin themselves to live by such principles. These times call for jubilee—we will be lifted up by a revolution of the heart; our principles will be dictated not by the nightmarish reality of the wicked, but by the dreams of a liberating God. Our hearts will be opened by the spirit of those who endured before us, not closed by the hands of the unjust."

Zucchini Tots Recipe

These tots are loaded with shredded zucchini, bread crumbs, and cheese!!
It makes for the perfect appetizer served with marinara sauce, or use it as a side dish!

Course: Appetizer, Snack; **Cuisine:** American

Prep Time: 5 minutes, **Cook Time:** 20 minutes, **Total Time:** 25 minutes

Yield: 2 Dozen

Calories: 394 kcal

Ingredients

1 medium zucchini
2 eggs
1/4 cup panko bread crumbs
1/4 cup regular bread crumbs
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
3/4 tsp garlic powder
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
Marinara

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 400. Line a baking sheet with parchment or spray with cooking spray.

Grate the zucchini into a clean dish towel. Wrap the towel up and squeeze out as much liquid as possible.

In a large bowl, stir together the zucchini, eggs, panko, bread crumbs, salt, pepper, garlic powder, and cheese.

Scoop by rounded spoonfuls onto the prepared baking sheet. Bake 20-25 minutes, or until golden brown.

Serve warm with marinara sauce for dipping.

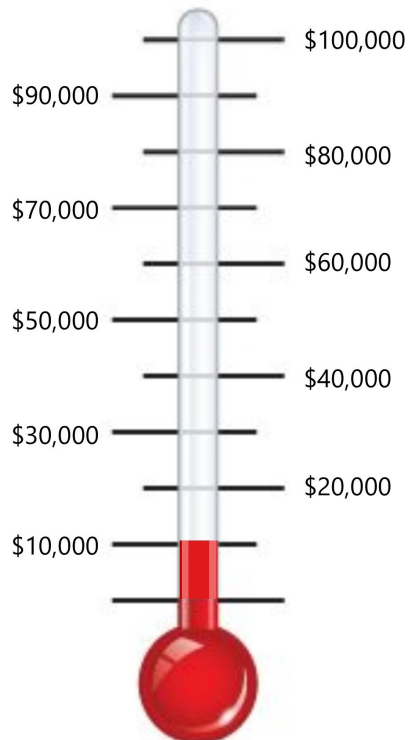

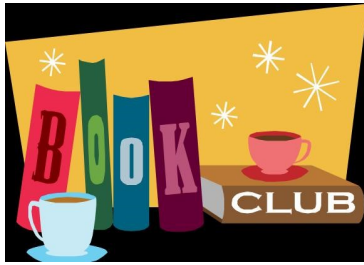
